Streamlined Permit Processing

The City of Arlington has implemented what is considered to be truly a one-stop-shop streamlined process for permitting. The City now offer permit processing without ever having to step foot in the Permit Center (unless you prefer to visit us).

The City achieved this goal in March 2014 after almost 4 years of restructuring processes, implementing project management policies, upgrading from permit management software to a system management web-based system, updating the city web-site, and the implementation of an electronic application and payment process.

Any customer that is in need of any type of permit simply has to go the city website (www.arlingtonwa.gov), choose their permit application, fill it out on-line and press submit. Building plans and other supporting documentation can be uploaded and submitted as well. Once received, the application and accompanying documentation is reviewed. Once approved, an email is sent to the applicant with their electronic permit along with step-by-step instructions to make their payment on-line, through a secure payment portal.

The new management system is known as iWorQ and is a web-based program that allows the customer to pay for their permits on-line, schedule inspections electronically, and view the status of their submittal and progress once development has been approved. The system also allows all field inspectors to enter inspection data from the site via personal iPads. This provides instant feedback to the customer who can view the status of each inspection as it has occurred – in real time.

The management system also allows the citizens to interact directly with city staff by sending general questions, concerns, and complaints through the Service Request side of the system. Once a request has been received it is automatically disseminated and routed to the proper agency for action. The system generates an automated response and a ticket number where the customer can monitor the status of their request from start to finish.

We will continue to evaluate the newly implemented system and processes to ensure continued customer satisfaction.

Partnerships with Neighborhoods

The City is embarking on a new effort to promote sustainable neighborhood networks to increase safety, awareness, and civility within Arlington. Working together, neighbors have a powerful opportunity to improve quality of life and make our neighborhoods a great place to live, work, and play. Our primary goal is to build active relationships with our neighborhoods in order to serve you better. The City's Community Volunteer Coordinator, Maxine Jenft, is leading this charge.



Homeowners associations are critical to fostering stronger communities and participation in city government. They can also be an essential conduit to public safety personnel during times of all sorts of emergencies. In the coming weeks, known and active homeowners associations (HOA) will be receiving a questionnaire from the City that will provide us with more information on the HOA and ways to ensure that your neighborhood is receiving current information from the City. If you are a leader of an HOA be on the lookout for this questionnaire and be sure to complete it. If you are an HOA leader and you're not sure if the City has your contact information, please contact Maxine Jenft at mjenft@arlingtonwa.gov.

Smart 911 is coming soon!

The City of Arlington is pleased to announce that a new service, Smart911, will be available to all Arlington residents starting in early June 2014. Smart911 is a free service that allows residents to create a Safety Profile for their household that includes any information they want 9-1-1 dispatchers and first responders to have in the event of an emergency. A Safety Profile is a set of information about an individual, or a household that is contained within one account on Smart911.com. Information can include details about all members of the household, all phone numbers (mobile, landline or VOIP) and all addresses including home, work and even vacation homes. Users can also add details about medical conditions, medications, vehicles, pets and even emergency contacts and current photos. Then, when anyone in that household or business dials 9-1-1 from a phone number associated with their Safety Profile, their profile is immediately displayed to the 9-1-1 dispatcher, providing additional information that can be used to assist in the proper response to the proper location. Information stored with Smart911 is secure and your information is made available ONLY to 9-1-1 call takers and responders ONLY in the event you call 9-1-1. Smart911 utilizes the highest standards in physical and computer security technologies and conducts regular audits to ensure all information held in Smart911 is kept secure, and only made available to 9-1-1 and emergency responders who are responding to or planning for emergencies.

When you dial 9-1-1 today the information received by the 9-1-1 call center can be limited based on the type of phone you are calling on. With Smart911, anytime you make an emergency call from a phone registered with your Safety Profile, the 9-1-1 system recognizes your phone number and automatically displays your profile on the screen of the call taker who receives your call. At a time when you may be panicked, or unable to communicate, or it could be unsafe to communicate, Smart911 ensures that the details you would need to tell 9-1-1 are immediately available in the event you cannot verbally provide them.

At a time when seconds count, Smart911 provides details that could help our first responders the second an emergency call is placed. You don't plan to call 9-1-1, but now you can plan ahead. Our first responders are better equipped to help you when you create a Smart911 Safety Profile at www.smart911.com.



A Message from Chief Stedman

On behalf of the men and women of the Arlington fire Department, I want to share my deepest appreciation for the residents and businesses of the greater Arlington community for your incredible support and assistance over the past two months. On Saturday, March 22nd, our world changed dramatically with the devastating Oso landslide. As the providers of Emergency Medical care for the entire Stillaguamish Valley, up and through Darrington, crews from the Arlington Fire department were some of the first emergency responders on scene. I have witnessed a lot in my 36 years as a firefighter – floods, wildfires, big structure fires, riots. Nothing in my career could ever compare to what I witnessed on March 22nd.

As word of the immense devastation began to trickle, then flood throughout the community, many of you stepped forward to help in countless ways to ensure we could continue our work. We received innumerable deliveries of food and drink to fuel us. You answered our call to care for your friends and neighbors, for heavy machinery, lighting, small hand tools, and everything in between. You donated your time working along side our crews, felling trees, clearing debris, helping us recover our friends and neighbors that we lost on that fateful day. You called, mailed, and emailed your words of encouragement, lifting us all up in our time of need. And you endured the “invasion” of 100+ agencies at all levels of local, state, and federal government as the entire nation came to our aid. To each and every one of you that gave of your time, your talents, your treasure, I say thank you.

Over the past two months, Arlington Fire has continued to provide first class fire prevention and emergency medical care. At the same time, we have spent untold hours working with our brothers and sisters of Oso, Darrington, and Arlington Rural Fire at the site of the slide. In the coming months, our community focus will shift to recovery, economically and emotionally, and preparing for the future. Our efforts will be devoted to caring for our employees and our community members that were gravely impacted by the slide and maintaining and nurturing the relationships that we have built and strengthened through this time of crisis. Our hearts will heal with time, but we will never forget the 43 lives that were lost and the 13 we were able to rescue.

I am proud and honored to serve this compassionate, caring community. As one of our captains told me with tears in his eyes, “It truly is an honor to be called to serve the residents of the great Stillaguamish Valley.” I couldn’t agree more.

The large open space on the west side of the Airport allows for large car show events. The annual Dragstrip Reunion is a throwback to when the Airport was used as a dragstrip for muscle cars. The carshow raises money for the Arlington Boys and Girls Club and is set for September 13 this year <http://www.arlingtondragstripreunion.com/>.



The Arlington Airport Office hosts an Arlington Appreciation Day each year. The event includes free flights for youth by local pilots, flight simulators, inflatables, and other fun family activities. This year the event will be held on Saturday, September 20 at the Airport Office.

City Projects for 2014

As the city of Arlington is wrapping up the 67th Ave Final Phase project, staff is getting ready to start work on a new set of projects to enhance the Arlington community. This summer, as you see the orange vests, please remember to drive safely through construction zones and to remember that these workers are working for your community. To receive weekly updates on construction projects, sign up to receive the City’s weekly e-Newsletter.

89th Ave Water System Improvements – The Water Utility will be making improvements to the water distribution system along 89th Ave, between 172nd St and 186th St. These improvements will increase pressure and fire flow in this neighborhood.

172nd St Sewer Connection – The Sewer Utility will make the final connection to the new sewer system that was installed during the SR-9 Roundabout project. This connection will cross 172nd Ave at 85th St. Once this final connection is completed, sewer service will be available to all four corners of the of the SR-9 Roundabout.

Prairie Creek Improvements (Phase 2A) - The City will return to work on Prairie Creek this year to finish improvements that were started last year. This project replaces undersized culverts and cleans accumulated sediment from Prairie Creek channel. This work will reduce flooding and enhance the creek’s fish habitat. This summer the 204th St culvert will be replaced and sediment will be removed from the creek between 71st Ave and 74th Ave.

Alcazar & Gilman Improvements – Water utilities, storm drainage facilities and new road surfacing is planned for the Alcazar and Gilman neighborhood. A failing 4-inch water main will be replaced with a new 12-inch water main. This project will improve water reliability and increased fire flow capacity. An undersized storm drain will also be replaced from the Alcazar/Division intersection to the north end of Talcott Ave. After the utility work is complete, a new road surface will be installed from the Alcazar/Division intersection to the Talcott/Gilman intersection.

67th Ave Sewer Extension - The 67th Ave 24-inch sewer main line will be extended from where it left off as part of the 67th Ave Final Phase Project, to approximately 700-feet south at the edge of the former Northwest Hardwoods facility. This extension will insure there is sufficient sewer capacity for any future development at the former Northwest Hardwoods facility.

Pavement Preservation – Last year’s creation of the Transportation Benefit District (TBD) allows the City to begin much needed pavement preservation work on the city streets. This year the following streets are scheduled to be preserved:

178th Ave Neighborhood – Slurry Seal

179th Ave Neighborhood – Slurry Seal

French Ave (Division to Highland) – Partial reconstruction and slurry seal

Haller Parking Lot – A new parking lot will be installed on the corner of Cox Ave and West Ave. The City will taking down an old house at the corner of Cox and Haller and constructing a parking lot to serve visitors to the PW Administration Office, Haller Park, and Centennial Trail.

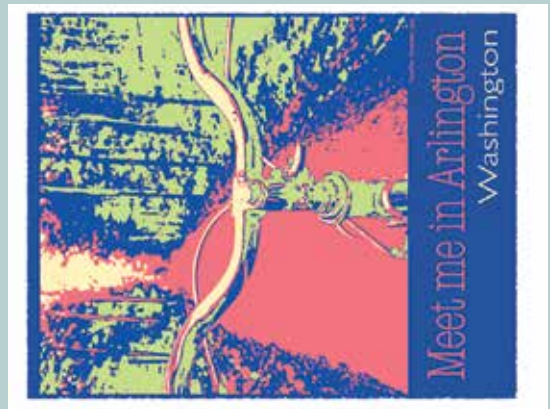
